Their Provincial Wildlife Directors also make presentations as we do at AFGA conference. It was also interesting to find out that at this time there are no cases of CDW reported in the province of Manitoba!

Rod Dick Past President and life member was asked to attend a CWD conference back in March. His in-depth report was submitted to all zones which hopefully the clubs have received as well. After arriving home my phone has not stopped, there is a never-ending stream of phone calls and emails coming in. Only time I have not been able to receive calls is when I am out of cell phone reception area which means I am in the mountains on a day long trail ride with others of

the same passion.

One item I feel is of great importance that has come up is that zone meetings seem to fall on the same dates. STUDY ON THE VALUE OF FISHING, HUNTING, TRAPPING AND SHOOTING:

In doing so data will be collected in all parts of the country and analyzed prior to the up-coming federal election in October. At some point in time you will have the opportunity to provide your input into your conservation activities via a survey. It is our goal to have this project carried out during the early summer of 2019.

FURTHER TO THIS PROJECT:


Our sister organizations national priorities with AFGA such as firearms and CWD to name a couple, and therefore are discussing the potential for a country-wide campaign late this summer and fall to put more weight and emphasis behind these priorities during the lead up to the October election. This is still in the planning stages so stay posted as to how you can help. One thing that's been re-enforced to me by politicians is that just because we have provincial MLAs and federal MPs does not mean that they do not talk to one another and stay abreast of current issues.

Formed under the umbrella of the Onoway Fish & Game Club in the spring of 2014 a group of ladies came together to engage in new outdoor skills and camaraderie. The group was so successful that it grew to 75 members and hence the Ladies League was formed. MY MAIN TOPIC for this issue is AFGA resolutions. I will deal with possible improvements to our resolutions process in a future report, but for now will focus on the process that is currently in place. Our Resolution, Recommendation and Policy Statement Procedures are well detailed in the Operations Manual of the Alberta Fish and Game Association, which any member can access at: https://www.afga.org/wp-content/uploads/2019/01/operations-manual-aug-2018.pdf.

Key points:

 Resolutions originating from the members of our clubs and carried at each level proceed through the Club, Zones and the Alberta Fish and Game Executive, to the annual conference to be voted on by the Conference Delegates, and hence to the Government body concerned.

The formulation, handling and

The formulation, handling and presentation of resolutions are a very important part of our activities.

- A Resolution is a formal statement by members that must be considered.
- A resolution must always be presented in writing. If it is presented orally, it becomes a motion, not a resolution.
- Members and/or Clubs may raise resolutions at any time of the year.

One of the shared tasks that falls to the 1st VP is chairing the resolutions session at the Association's Annual Conference, and a big part of that process is organizing the resolutions that have been passed by the Clubs and Zones prior to the AFGA Executive meeting held in December. When cleared by the AFGA executive all resolutions then need to be distributed to all Clubs well in advance of the AFGA annual conference in order to be debated at the club level, so that conference delegates know how the club they are representing wishes them to vote when the resolution comes to the convention floor. The time window for all of this to happen between the fall

Zone meetings, (usually held in October) and the December Executive Meeting allows little time for interaction with the originating club(s) if clarification of intent and re-wording, or combining similar resolutions submitted by different clubs is indicated.


While resolutions cannot bypass the club-zone-AFGA Executive before coming to the convention floor, there is no reason not to seek assistance in getting them as clear as possible at the earliest stage with the goal of "clear sailing" through the process to voting. Please forward any resolutions that you are considering to me, (along with your club and contact information) as soon as possible, and we will work together to ensure that the resolution has "clearly stated the problem, supported the statements with facts, provided a relevant information source, clearly identified the desired resolution of the problem and suggested a way to resolve the problem."

Fishing Chair Report

WHAT ACTUALLY CHANGES GOING FORWARD?

THE PROVINCIAL ELECTION is over. With the resultant change in the governing party comes a period when the question of "what actually changes going forward" is on everyone's mind. The United Conservative platform was extensive https://www.albertastrongandfree.ca/wp-content/uploads/2019/04/Alberta-Strong-and-Free-Platform-1.pdf. Repealing the "Carbon Tax" was a big platform issue but overall the environmental agenda had few specifics.

A quick look at the environmental side of the platform stated that a "United Conservative government will implement a Common-Sense Conservation Plan that will take a balanced approach to environmental stewardship recognizing that recreation, economic and use, conservation can and should support each other. Encourage and increase the use of development credits and conservation offsets in provincial development policy. Protect creeks and streams on the Eastern Slopes by adding \$1 million in funding (tripling provincial funding from \$531,000) to the Alberta Riparian Habitat Protection Society's "Cows and Fish" Program, while seeking matching funds from the private sector. Apply a mandatory \$30 trail permit fee to Off-Highway Vehicles (OHV) and camping trailers to pay for restoring and creating OHV trails and preventing damage in Alberta's great outdoors, and to hire additional enforcement officers.

Implement a balanced back country

land use plan to ensure all Albertans can enjoy public lands and appreciate the wilderness. Immediately form a Caribou Range Task Force of local municipal governments, the Northwest Species at Risk Committee, forestry and other industries. Indigenous representatives. habitat scientists to review the Alberta Caribou Draft Plan. Ensure that the province's land use consultations and planning are completed before any new long-term decisions are made on habitat protection."

My belief is that much of the angling community is hoping that there will be a different focus from fisheries managers in the province under the leadership of the new government. The reality however is a balancing act exists between the bureaucracy and our elected officials, where often internal direction continues to be the driver and altered paths do not gain traction. While elected politicians try to set the direction on the broader issues, often it is the nuances and application which are controlled largely by the bureaucracy that affect us as anglers every day. Perhaps by my next article in Outdoor Canada we will have clearer understanding of what possible changes or initiatives might be instore that will impact anglers, fisheries and habitat under our new government.

There was one development federally related to the Species at Risk Act (SARA) that did occur since my last column. Rainbow Trout in in the Athabasca River watershed have been proposed to be listed as endangered, Bull Trout in Western Arctic as a species of special concern, and Bull Trout as threatened in Saskatchewan-Nelson watershed. There was a thirty-day window for the Alberta Fish and Game Association to respond to the proposed listing. We provided a list of concerns related to SARA and the proposed listings along with conditions that should be considered by the Government of Canada before proceeding with the listings. The AFGA provisional support for the listings is subject to these concerns being addressed in a meaningful way.

I have been remiss in not showcasing the many projects and programs related to fisheries undertaken by Alberta Fish and Game Clubs around the province. These include signage, addressing environmental issues such as disposing of fishing line, monitoring oxygen levels, development of trout ponds, access, angler mentorship, support of Kids Can Fish events and the list goes on.

revised Alberta Fishing Education Program developed by the Alberta Hunter Education and Instructors' Association (AHEIA) should be available soon. This will provide another opportunity for club or member involvement in an area where AFGA already has a high presence. This will be become a foundational component of the angling community's stewardship of our fisheries resource.

Citizen Science is an area where clubs



and members can become important components of environmental and fisheries research. Ray Makowecki, AFGA Zone 5 and area clubs are spearheading a citizen science project monitoring water quality and dissolved oxygen in lakes throughout North East Alberta. At the AFGA Annual Conference, Sean Simmons of Angler's Atlas showed how through the company's online website or mobile platforms for Android and IOS devices anglers can record data that is valuable for their own use but also aid fisheries managers in making informed decisions. Data obtained through the platform appears to be comparative to expensive formal creel surveys. This was demonstrated in relation to last summer's creel

survey on the Bow River where results appear to be statistically similar. These findings are being validated by researchers at the University of Alberta. This is particularly exciting as the reality is most waterbodies have limited or no data associated with them. Further, there is little likelihood it will be obtained formally through traditional research projects or monitoring. Better yet, there is low cost-plus real-time reporting. Would urge everyone to download the app or use the online website https:// www.anglersatlas.com/ to help fill in numerous knowledge gaps related to the fisheries resource in Alberta.

Environment Chair Report

IT HAS BEEN A BUSY INITIATION

as your Environment Chair. A few weeks following my election, I attended the Alberta Invasive Species Council meeting in Lacombe. This 2-day event really opened my eyes to the sheer number of invasive species we are trying to deal with in this province. Most everyone knows of Purple Loosestrife, Eurasian Watermilfoil, Chronic Wasting Disease and Whirling Disease. Did you know that the Aquatic Invasive Species Pocket Guide issued by Alberta's Environment and Parks lists 27 fish species, 16 plant species, 11 invertebrate species, and 8 diseases as invasive? Discussion was brisk on a number of topics. I encourage everyone to visit their website: https:// abinvasives.ca/.

A developing concern in Alberta is around the use of weed-free gravel and forage. A number of states and U.S. municipal governments have moved to a certification standard for both, understanding that eliminating invasive plants at the pit and the forage field is preferable to dealing with them everywhere else.

presentations focused Flowering Rush. One dealt with an eight-year battle that the County of Red Deer is having on a relatively small wetland area south of Innisfail; their challenges in dealing with multiple government agencies and learnings from the fight itself. The name, Flowering Rush, is quite misleading; as the plant primarily spreads through root rhizomes. The second speaker spot-lighted efforts on the Columbia River system in Washington State where Flowering Rush is enhancing the survival of invasive Northern Pike, thereby supporting their predation on native salmon stocks. This study identified that all North American Flowering Rush is one of nine area-specific genetic variations, each with its own characteristics. Interestingly, none

match currently identified variations in Europe, where Flowering Rush is actually a species-at-risk. The source of the North American infestation is still unknown. This genetic variability is important, since the study is now trying to identify biological agents (insects, for example) that could be used to stem the tide.

A fascinating story has been unfolding on the Smoky River called the Tansy Island cleanup in the MD of Greenview. Common Tansy was identified during a routine inspection in 2015. Since then, an ever-growing group of volunteers facilitated by the Grand Prairie River Rats has had yearly programs to control tis invasion. If you have the time, join them. Finally, I learned of the rapidly growing populations of Prussian Carp in the Red Deer and Bow River watersheds. Elimination is no longer feasible, but work is directed to preventing their spread to other Alberta watersheds. If you catch one, don't release it; kill it.

In early April, I attended the Alberta Ecotrust Foundation Environmental Gathering in Calgary. I was there to continue the work of my predecessor, Chelsea Jaeger, in presenting your Alberta Fish and Game Association as a key founding member in the Alberta conservation and preservation movement.

The opening keynote speaker, Dr. Brad Stelfox of the ALCES Group, spoke to the question; "Is Alberta's Pathway Sustainable?" Building on a model for population, industrial, and agricultural growth based on historic and recent trends, he demonstrated how little "bush" will remain by 2050 if we don't do things differently. He then identified the primary driver for all this development as population, and asked the question: How many people are enough? I hope to provide a link if this presentation is posted at a later date.

I found one of the workshops presented particularly useful: an overview of a course on how to deliver unpopular messages. It talked of ways to work towards understanding and eventual resolution while avoiding the conflict and polarization so common in today's world. I hope to use this approach in my work going forward. Have a look under: http://cowsandfish.org/about/workshops.html.

An important appeal was heard on April 30, at the Environmental Appeals Board in Edmonton. A Sand and Gravel Development called the Phelan Pit have already been approved on the Freeman River near its confluence with the Athabasca River. This appeal was of an approval under the Water Act of a proposed end pit lake and the construction of a river flood protection works. The appellant was supported both by Mr. Ray Makowecki of the Next Step Team and Mr. Duane Radford. A decision is pending.

In closing, I urge everyone to support and follow Play, Clean & Go and Clean, Drain, & Dry Your Gear to protect our outdoors!


